The Community Thanksgiving Dinner Program embodies tikkun olam, the Jewish principle of "repairing the world," through enduring community service. Each year, this remarkable effort brings together nearly 1,000 volunteers from diverse backgrounds to provide Thanksgiving meals to more than 4,000 people across Westchester and Putnam counties, and the Bronx.

For over two decades, Temple Shaaray Tefila in Bedford Corners has served as the operation's home base, providing essential facilities including a commercial kitchen, security, and utilities. Volunteers from many communities, including Temple Beth El of Northern Westchester, various churches and mosques, and unaffiliated individuals come together to help their neighbors.

The program provides grocery bags with turkeys and all the fixings for families who cook at home; delivers fully prepared meals to those unable to cook, and supplies catering trays for many community centers and social service agencies including Boys & Girls Clubs, Neighbors Link, Hope's Door, veterans groups, senior centers, and men's shelters.

Preparations begin the Saturday before Thanksgiving, with volunteers of all ages chopping, peeling, and cooking. Others prepare dishes at home, donate funds for grocery gift cards, or shop for supplies. An army of delivery volunteers distributes food throughout the region from Monday through Wednesday of Thanksgiving week.

This inspiring interfaith community project exemplifies tikkun olam in action—repairing the world through compassionate service that strengthens our community bonds.

The Community Security Service (CSS) is a nonprofit headquartered in White Plains, dedicated to safeguarding Jewish communities through volunteer-led security initiatives. As an apolitical 501(c)(3) organization, CSS has pioneered a transformative approach to community protection: empowering Jewish communities to take ownership of their own security.

Starting with a handful of volunteers protecting a New York City synagogue in 2007, CSS has evolved into a nationwide network with thousands of trained volunteers safeguarding hundreds of Jewish institutions.

In Westchester County, CSS has become an integral part of community life, with over 300 trained volunteers working tirelessly to protect synagogues, cultural centers, and community events. Their presence has been especially vital following recent surges in anti-Semitic incidents, providing physical security and peace of mind to local Jewish groups, their neighbors and the broader Westchester community.

By creating safer spaces for religious and cultural gatherings, CSS helps preserve the diverse cultural fabric that defines Westchester County. Their work transcends security, fostering community resilience, interfaith understanding, and collective responsibility.

CSS volunteers receive comprehensive, professional-grade training that equips them to identify threats while maintaining a welcoming environment for all community members. Through their dedication, CSS exemplifies how community-led initiatives can effectively address modern challenges while strengthening bonds across Westchester County's myriad local communities.
